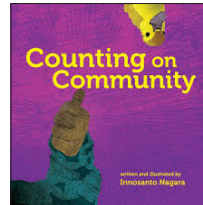


KINDERGARTEN, HERE I COME!

Whether it's the first day of school jitters or the hundredth day of school party, every aspect of the kindergarten experience is introduced with a light and funny poem.

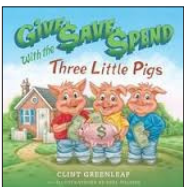


COUNTING ON COMMUNITY

Children are encouraged to recognize the value of their community, the joys inherent in healthy eco-friendly activities, and the agency they possess to make change.

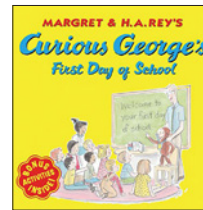


GIVE, SAVE, SPEND WITH THE THREE LITTLE PIGS

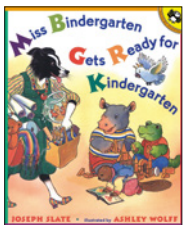


CURIOUS GEORGE'S FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL

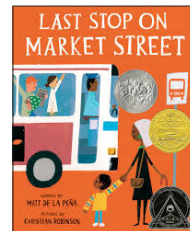


MISS BINDERGARTEN GETS READY FOR KINDERGARTEN

This rhyming, brightly illustrated book is the perfect way to practice the alphabet and to introduce young children to kindergarten.

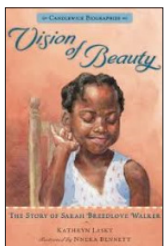


LAST STOP ON MARKET STREET

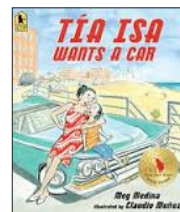


VISION OF BEAUTY: THE STORY OF SARAH BREEDLOVE WALKER

As the first African-American woman entrepreneur, Sarah Breedlove transformed the image of African-American women, identifying and marketing products for their unique cosmetic and beauty needs.

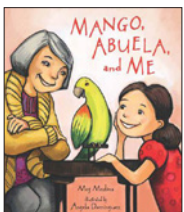


TIA ISA WANTS A CAR / TIA ISA QUIERE UN CARRO

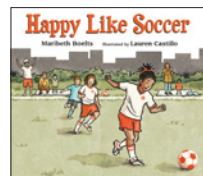

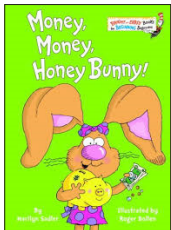

Honey Bunny Funnybunny has lots and lots and lots of money. Some she saves, some she spends on herself, and some she spends on her friends.



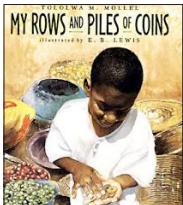

Chloe is stung by the lost opportunity for friendship that could have been had she shown a little kindness toward Maya.



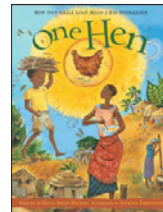
MY ROWS AND PILES OF COINS

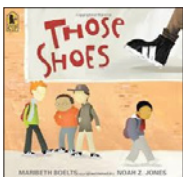
ONE HEN: HOW ONE SMALL LOAN MADE A BIG DIFFERENCE

Inspired by true events, One Hen tells the story of Kojo, a boy from Ghana who turns a small loan into a thriving farm and a livelihood for many.



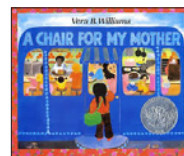
THOSE SHOES

All Jeremy wants is a pair of those shoes, the ones everyone at school seems to be wearing. Though Jeremy's grandma says they don't have room for "want," just "need."



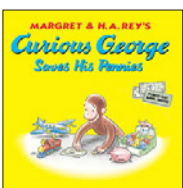
A CHAIR FOR MY MOTHER

When George decides to save up for that special red train in the toy store, he doesn't realize how long it will take — or how hard he'll have to work for his money.



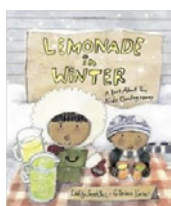

In this contemporary classic Chester Raccoon seeks love and reassurance from his mother as he ventures out into the world to attend his very first day of school.



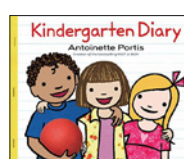
LEMONADE IN WINTER: A BOOK ABOUT TWO KIDS COUNTING MONEY
